This appreciation deals with the position of Australia, as a South-East Asian country, in the event of a conflict between one or more of the Western powers and one or more of the Eastern European countries.



(b) The Defence Committee, in the light of the deteriorating international situation, recommended on 15th April, 1949 (Defence Committee Minute No. 68/1949) that authority be given for the Joint Intelligence Bureau and the Defence Signals Branch "to be fully staffed and completed with the least possible delay."

'It will be appreciated that information on the points mentioned in paragraph 2 of your memorandum is continually changing.
